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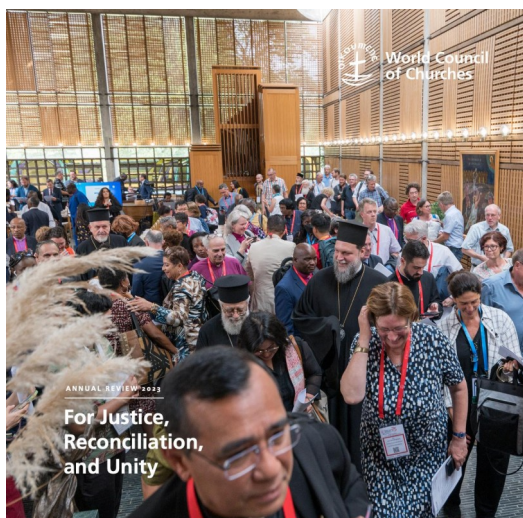
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News from the World Council of Churches (WCC)



WCC Annual Review 2023 — For Justice, Reconciliation and Unity

The annual review of the activity of the WCC records many of the activities undertaken by the council during 2023. “The journey of the WCC in



2023 involved many international visits that built bridges, fostered dialogue and created safe spaces in which we can disagree with love, friendship, and civility and keep unity still intact.” The WCC Annual Review includes a special visual section that commemorates the WCC’s 75th anniversary and highlights an unprecedented number of exhibitions that graced the Ecumenical Centre.

In a happy coincidence between the liturgical calendars of eastern and western churches, we will all be celebrating **Easter** on the same date: April 20th 2025.

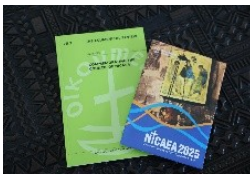


Nicaea 2025

Living the apostolic faith together today: Commemorating 1700th anniversary of the first Ecumenical Council at Nicaea

2025 - marks the 1700th anniversary of the first **Council of Nicaea**, which took place in the year 325. This was the Council that gave us the Nicene Creed which is still recognised today by most churches as a legitimate statement of our Christian faith. Racial Justice Sunday is an occasion for Christians in Britain to collectively focus on racial justice. It began in 1995, and generally took place on the second Sunday in September. In 2017, a decision was taken to move the date to the second Sunday in February (a direct swap with Education Sunday, which was then in February). Week of Prayer for Christian Unity

From 18th until 25th January the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is being celebrated by many countries around the world.

For the year 2025, the prayers and reflections for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity were prepared by the brothers and sisters of the monastic community of Bose in northern Italy. The resources are jointly published by the Dicastery for Promoting Christian Unity and the World Council of Churches.

This year marks the 1,700th anniversary of the first Christian Ecumenical Council, held in Nicaea, near Constantinople in 325 AD. This commemoration provides a unique opportunity to reflect on and celebrate the common faith of Christians, as expressed in the Creed formulated during this Council. The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 2025 offers an invitation to draw on this shared heritage and to enter more deeply into the faith that unites all Christians. This year's theme is: **"Do you believe this?" (Jn 11:26)**

CTE Forum 2025: 17 –19th March 2025

Forum is the largest event in the Churches Together in England (CTE) diary and takes place every three years. It is a delegate conference that brings together more than three hundred representatives of CTE's more than 50 national [Member Churches](#), [Intermediate Bodies](#), and 91



different [Charities and Networks in Association](#). CTE's Forum is the broadest representative ecumenical gathering of Christians in England and the next Forum will take place from 17 –19 March 2025.

[This Bill Snelson Young Ecumenists Fund](#) has been set up by Churches Together in England and the Snelson family in memory of Bill Snelson who was General Secretary of Churches Together England from 1997 to 2008.

Sam Rigby (pictured below right) is a recipient of this grant. He heard about it



via the CTMR young adults group. Sam was awarded £608 to visit the World Council of Churches in Geneva and the Chemin Neuf community at Hautecombe Abbey in France. There are two rounds of applications each year and

the next round will open early 2025 with the expected closing date being 31st March 2025. Across two rounds, there is approximately £6,000 available. There are no minimum or maximum amounts for which one can apply.

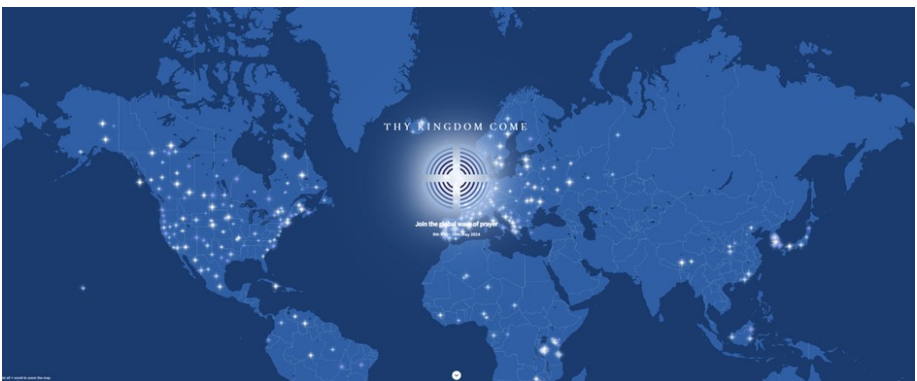
Light up the World in Prayer

Every person, household and church are encouraged to pray during the 11 days in their own way.

Specifically, every Christian across the globe is invited to pray that God's Spirit might work in the lives of 5 people who have not responded with their 'Yes' to God's call.

This was the jokey response to a unique way for Churches Together in the Merseyside Region to celebrate the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. The Church Leaders had each invited a small group of colleagues involved in ecumenical work and around 40 people gathered at the Margaret Clitheroe Centre, home of our CTMR office, for a programme centred around a shared lunch - deliberately planned to simply provide space for conversations to start, working relationships to deepen and new ideas to spark.

The event was brought to a conclusion through an act of shared prayer and commitment to unity led by the Bishop of Liverpool Rt. Revd. Dr John Perumbalath, but not before participants were challenged to write down at least one action they committed to take as a result of being together.

CTMR Church Leaders Invite Local MPs

On 8th March 2024, senior church leaders representing Churches Together in the Merseyside Region (CTMR) hosted a lunch for Members of Parliament in Liverpool City Region. Lunch was followed by a rich discussion about how to work together to meet the needs of the communities we serve and to effect positive change. A robust and welcome challenge from the MPs was that they would like to hear faith leaders speaking out more frequently and with a sense of urgency about matters of social injustice. Faith leaders were also encouraged, in response to Keir Starmer's commitment to work with faith groups, to proactively engage with the Labour Party. Church Leaders took the opportunity to encourage those MPs who would be standing in the upcoming election to engage with the Hustings that local churches organised and hosted. While recognising the busy life of our Members of Parliament, both in Westminster and their constituencies, Church Leaders were keen that channels of communication remained open and that we fostered collaborative working for the benefit of our city and region. The event was attended by 5 MPs with 2 members of staff and senior leaders from the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Liverpool and Diocese of Shrewsbury, the Independent Churches, the United Reformed Church, the Methodist Church and the Anglican Diocese of Chester.

CTMR Church Leaders and Together Liverpool: 40 years of 'Faith in the City' anniversary— Appointment



2025 marks the 40th anniversary of the [Faith in the City report](#) and CTMR in conjunction with Together Liverpool would like to commemorate the publication of this report by examining the effect it has had. They would like to do this by showing how faith-led groups impact on



the Liverpool City Region at present and by looking to the future.

Therefore, CTMR in conjunction with Together Liverpool have made an important appointment to the post of 'Faith in the City - Lead Development Officer'. Francesca (Fran) D'Arcy (*see photo*) who hails from Liverpool has taken up this post at the beginning of December and is mainly working towards an event to take place in November 2025.

- # Heightening public and faith community awareness of the historic and ongoing contributions of churches in the Liverpool City Region.
- # Reflection on the impact of "Faith in the City" over the past 40 years, including successes and areas for growth.
- # Developing and promoting a new "Vision for the City" manifesto, outlining future commitments and roles for church and faith communities in civic and political life.
- # Strengthening relationships and dialogue between church leaders and political figures.

CTMR Civic Reception

A Civic Reception for Leaders of the Borough Councils and Mayors within the Merseyside Region is normally hosted annually by CTMR Church Leaders. Bishop Tom Neylon reported on the vigil in Southport which was attended by about 1,000 the day after the stabbings on the 30th July. Here is what he says:

"We have been deeply touched and saddened by the deaths of Bebe, Elsie and Alice and the injuries suffered by the young girls and 2 adults who attended the dance event in Hart Street Southport, on Monday, 29th July. We share the shock and grief of their families and friends, and the residents of Southport.

I attended the Vigil on Tuesday 30th July outside The Atkinson, on Lord Street. There were many people of all ages who gathered calmly and

peacefully to pray and reflect on the horrific event that had taken place, just over 24 hours ago. People were accommodating as some were making their way through the crowds to get a better view of the platform where the Mayor of Sefton Cllr June Burns, the Methodist Minister and Chaplain to the Southport and Ormskirk Hospital Trust, the Reverend Martin Abrams and myself were standing during the Vigil.

Martin began by recalling the names of the those who had died, mentioned those who were injured, some seriously, the affected families and those who had come to their aid as police officers, paramedics and hospital staff. There was a regional response to this tragedy. By gathering, I think that those present showed their solidarity with those who are suffering the most and pledged to support them in whatever way possible as they come to terms with the events of Monday 29 July 2024.

The Catholic Archdiocese of Liverpool and the Anglican Diocese of Liverpool joined forces for the inaugural Ecumenical LOUDfence Event on

Saturday 9th March 2024.



This initiative aimed to provide a platform for all those affected by abuse, offering healing and support through a visible demonstration of soli-

darity. The event began with a ribbon-tying ceremony outside the Anglican Cathedral at 12:30pm, followed by a Non-Denominational Blessing from Dean of the Anglican Cathedral, The Very Rev Dr Sue Jones.



Participants then embarked on a Walk of Hope along Hope Street, culminating at the Metropolitan Cathedral Plaza. Upon arrival, a Prayer Service led by Archbishop Malcolm McMahon

and a ribbon-tying ceremony allowed attendees to express solidarity with victims and survivors of abuse. Those who wished were encouraged to read the LOUDfence prayer together. Attendees came from around the archdiocese and beyond, with some travelling from as far as West Yorkshire.

This ecumenical event welcomed individuals from diverse backgrounds, inviting survivors, supporters, and community members to stand together against abuse. Attendees were encouraged to tie ribbons and leave messages of support as a visible symbol of support, fostering a network of compassion and understanding.

The subsequent days saw both cathedrals engage in prayer and reflection, offering resources and support for victims and survivors of abuse.

Liverpool Seafarers Centre (LSC)



Liverpool Seafarers Centre is a member of the International Christian Maritime Association (ICMA). The association comprises Christian not-for-profit organisations working for the welfare of seafarers around the world. Founded in 1969, ICMA currently represents more than 450 seafarers' centres and 900 chaplains in approximately 125 countries.

Where it all began

It was officially established in October 2008, as a result of the merger between the Anglican Mersey Mission to Seafarers and the Catholic Apostleship of the Sea (Liverpool). These organisations recognised the importance of a comprehensive outreach program to better serve the seafaring community.

A Christmas thanks

Many donations were received for Seafarers' Christmas parcels which reminded these maritime workers that they were not forgotten and that their well-being matters. The Liverpool Seafarers Centre received donations of toiletries, confectionery, hats, gloves, stocking fillers. Businesses also include items of branded merchandise. They aimed to top last year's target of 1000 gift bags which were distributed to visiting seafarers from across the world throughout the month of December. A huge thank you for donations received. Support for Asylum Seekers (SAS) Destitution Project - 2024



Destitution Project Delivery

In 2024 SAS partner agencies have continued to provide practical humanitarian and wellbeing support for people seeking asylum and refuge in our local community. Where possible activities and social interaction have been made available in order to support their wellbeing and provide hope for the future.

SAS main partner agencies include Asylum Link Merseyside, Faiths4Change, Merseyside Refugee Support Network. Refugee Women Connect ended their delivery in January 2024. A big thank you to Alison Moore for liaising over this with CTMR/SAS.

Faiths4Change

Support from SAS continues to support our work in 2 ways.



We grow, harvest and donate organic vegetables and herbs from the St Michael's in the City Church 'Roots' Garden to the Micah foodbank which operates out of two central Liverpool churches on a weekly basis. The foodbank predominantly supports adult and children Asylum Seekers and Refugees. This year 73% of recipients are Asylum Seekers (1230 households) and 4% Refugees (72 households).

Aaron (Micah Foodbank Driver)

Since 1st January 2024 we've donated 216kg of vegetables and herbs at a value of £2384.00. An average of 500g per household, 432 households have benefited so far this year.

We've partnered with Myerscough College in an exciting Ministry of Justice programme with the RHS and HMP

Walton. People in prison gain horticulture training, including raising vegetable plug plants for community gardens. In June over 500 young

plants from the prison courses were brought to the Roots Garden to grow on, meaning all available



hands were needed to get them in the ground. These plants have provided a fantastic bounty for the food bank, including sweetcorn, kale, courgettes, spring onions and French beans.

SAS funding enables us to provide individual support to Asylum Seekers. Our long time Asylum Seeker volunteer gained leave to remain and is now settling into a flat, we cover his travel expenses to a community garden which enables him to enjoy social, physical and emotional wellbeing. From January 2024, ALM has had to strap itself in and get on with



things. Financially, we were not looking great through the Christmas period in 2023 but we have since rallied, through a lot of hard work and concentration, to get us where we need to be.

The emptying out of the Asylum System has continued apace, with the rush cause by the fast-track questionnaires, replaced by the new governments accelerated approach, with some receiving a decision days after their interviews, instead of months and years.

or even Refugee Week, the story of the year has been the Far-Right Threat, following the dreadful attack in Southport.



The photograph above shows the anti-fascist crowd who gathered to protect ALM against the threat and with over 1000 people packed into Overbury Street, it was quite incredible to feel the warmth and regard that people have for ALM, MRSN and the work that we do.

Following on from that, we've met with the Home Secretary, the Attorney General, the Head of the Charity Commission and the Head of the Lloyds Foundation, all of whom wanted to know how it had affected us and what we intended to do. What the Far-Right didn't expect when



they planned their attack, was that this would give us a platform to approach people at the heart of government or that our story would travel to New York, Oslo, Singapore and other places. People were incredibly supportive and thanks to SAS, CTMR and others, we are still here, despite everything, to care for those

most in need in our community.

Merseyside Refugee Support Network (MRSN)

A Case study

Context

Since August 2023 we have seen the impact of the Home Office clearing their asylum backlog. When positive decisions have been made “in bulk”, this has resulted in significant levels of refugee homelessness – including street homelessness (rough sleeping) and sofa surfing. Most SAS funds have been used to help refugee clients in an emergency or other destitute situation over the past year. Sometimes we offer emergency funds for food/toiletries when new refugees are destitute in

the gap between leaving the asylum system on grant of leave to remain and the first payment for universal credit benefits or paying for a night or two in a bunk room hostel – when no other housing options are open to them.



The homelessness situation is so bad it has also led us to buying tents, mats and sleeping bags. It feels like a last resort – but often it is the only “solution” where a client is not considered to be in “priority need” with council housing services.

The housing crisis is not unique to Merseyside - the long-standing under-investment in housing nationally has led to insufficient social housing. Social housing is for renting for those unable to buy, politicians have obscured “social housing” needs with “affordable housing”.

Single refugees and couples often find themselves street homeless, if the local authorities do not deem them to be in priority need. This situation is made worse when refugees are reunited with their spouses after a successful family reunion visa application. Many separated by years only to find that they have nowhere to live. It is such a tragedy that this is almost a daily occurrence in the world’s 6th richest economy.

A current homeless case involves a Refugee Family Reunion case – a family reunited after many years apart, a family who should have been able to be joyfully reunited. Dad has significant and enduring physical and mental health issues. His daughter, (also with health issues) and wife joined him last summer and in October we are still battling for them and trying to get a housing decision changed in order that this family can be a family together under one roof. They are only just coping, they are moving around daily sofa-surfing with different people in the local and regional diaspora communities or, on occasion, have no option but to sleep in a tent in the park or the local railway station.

Our casework support continues, and we are working with them to challenge the decisions by a local authority not to house them. The SAS fund allowed us to give them emergency support when they were destitute and not in receipt of benefits.

We will continue to pursue the case and seek legal housing advice going forward. *Seana Roberts, Manager, Merseyside Refugee Support Network*

Weekly ecumenical prayer group in Southport

In Southport there is a weekly ecumenical lay led prayer meeting with about 40-50 attendees. This has been in existence for about 25 years and all the major denominations are represented (Catholic, Anglican, Methodist, Salvation Army, Elim etc).

They meet at 7.30am for an hour every Tuesday morning at a different church each month. Specifically, it is to pray for the town as well as national and global issues.

This is a great forum for sharing information, communicating and can act as a catalyst for joint action.

In the month of August we were already timetabled to meet at St Patrick's Church where the funeral of Alice da Silva Aguiar was held who was killed in the Southport attack."

Dialogue between Faith communities



Merseyside Faith Leaders were hosted at Bishop's Lodge in Woolton on the 5th February 2024. (see image below). Michelle



Kirk from the Fire and Rescue Services Merseyside spoke about the work of fire services and about how faith leaders can cooperate with this institution to ensure that the service it provides is fully inclusive.

James Green presented the work of the Network of Kindness, which is engaged in social action in Merseyside. He invited the faith leaders to join in. The conversation included also reflections on the Ukrainian community in Liverpool and the marking of the second anniversary of the Russian invasion in February.



On the 24th February 2024, the second anniversary of the Russian invasion, a prayer vigil took place at 'St Nick's' Church, Pier Head, Liverpool. (see picture to the left).

On the 9th October 2024 Merseyside Faith Leaders met again at Bishop's Lodge (see picture below). This time the Lord Lieutenant and his team attended as did the present and past Vice Chancellors of Liverpool Hope University. The event was very



well attended and provided a great opportunity to share each other's stories and experiences – hopefully more meetings in the future will allow everyone to get to know each other better.

Papal Knighthood for Prof Gerald Pillay

This is how *Rev Monsignor John Devine OBE ended his address in Liverpool Cathedral*: "Liverpool Hope shares the name of the street that links our two cathedrals; the same street down which Pope John Paul II processed with Bishop David and Archbishop Derek on his visit to the city in 1982. Liverpool Hope University is the jewel in the crown of our city's ecumenical endeavour. Today we honour the contribution Professor Gerald Pillay has made not just to the University but to our churches and to the life of our city."

Prof Pillay expressed his "great honour to receive this papal knight-



hood. However, the honour conferred on me is in reality an acknowledgment by the Church of the importance of higher education and especially of the unique, trans-denominational foundation that Liverpool Hope University has become. The coming together of Catholic and Protestant colleges into a unit-

ed university foundation (without denominational control) was a brave educational experiment in ecumenism here in Liverpool, unparalleled anywhere else in Europe." Special thanks to Fr S. Having mapped over 100 faith organisations and contacts across the borough through the successful Cinnamon Social Action audit Alex continues to work on a community development pillar within the CVS delivery plan which includes a commitment to:

- ♦ develop infrastructure support with the faith sector
- ♦ help the faith sector receive and share information and develop links with community and voluntary organisations
- ♦ develop a codesigned forum/plan or mechanism supported by WCVS

The audit published in April discovered that faith groups in Wirral play a crucial role in supporting local communities. They engage in a wide range of social action activities, including operating food banks, providing debt advice, and assisting families.



The audit was conducted by the **Cinnamon Network**, a national organization that equips UK churches for social action, and **Together Wirral Churches**. Their objective was to assess the impact of faith-based organizations on communities.

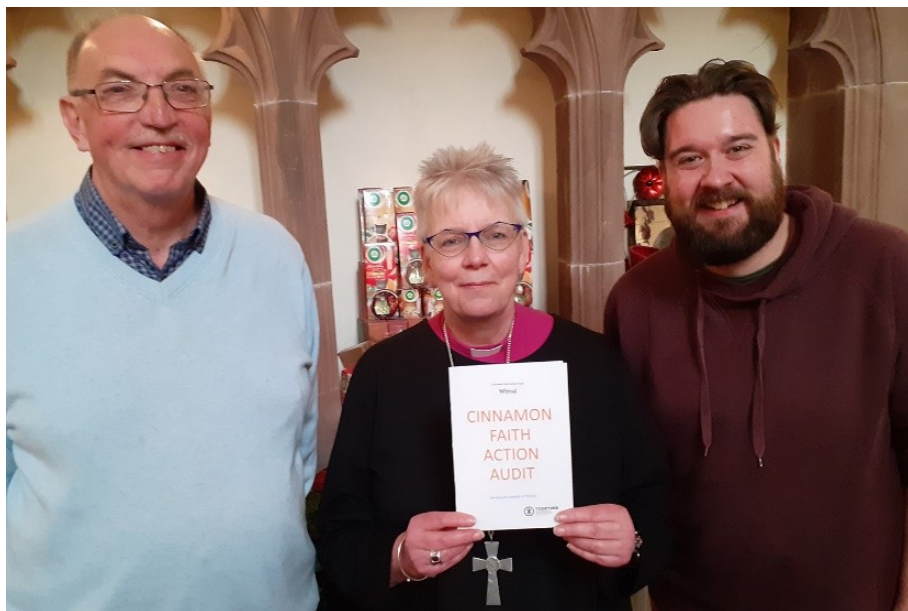

Together, these faith groups delivered **609 activities** to **58,277 beneficiaries**, made possible in part by the support and time contributed by a virtual army of 3,051 volunteers. The estimated financial value provided by the faith groups amounted to over £8 million.

Faith groups contribute to their communities in various ways, including:

- *Community Cohesion*
- *Giving children a good start in life*
- *Reducing social isolation*
- *Supporting families*
- *Help people in financial crisis*
- *Helping people to live healthier lives*

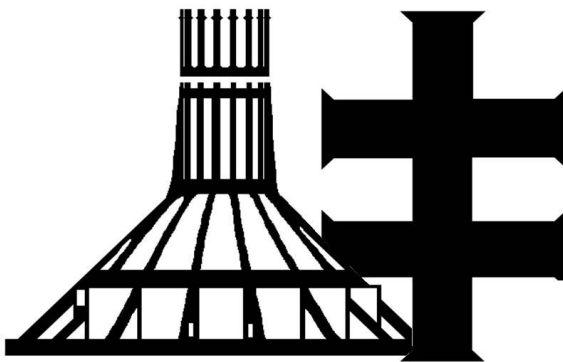
